First, it's important to set aside any preconceived ideas you might have. No, you don't need to have an in-depth knowledge of the life and work of Gabrielle Roy to become a volunteer in her birthplace. Yes, there are other things to do than to give guided tours. And no, not all the volunteers spend several hours per week at the Maison.

In fact, there are all kinds of opportunities to do volunteer

work at Maison Gabrielle-Roy. For instance: cleaning and general upkeep of the house; receiving guests when activities are underway; gardening and landscaping; office work and simple accounting (administration of the museum's gift shop); developing the museum and organising exhibitions; organisation and management of special activities such as Maison Gabrielle-Roy's annual brunch.

Volunteers can also become members of the Board of Directors that meets once a month to manage the organisation, supervise the staff and determine key strategies. Members of the Board also sit on other committees in which they can exercise their talents in fields that they have experience in or that interest them. These are the committees: museum development, planning and finances, marketing and fundraising, programming, volunteers.

You only have a few hours of volunteer work to offer through-

#### HAIKUS ON THE ST. LAWRENCE

Those of you who follow my entries in the Maison Gabrielle-Roy newsletters know of my passion for haikus, a form of poetry invented by the Japanese in the XVI<sup>th</sup> century, that has since spread throughout the world.

Spread is not an exaggeration as I regularly discover new sites and new groups of haiku poets across Canada, the United States, Africa and Europe.

You have probably the idea that haiku poets are gentle, curious dreamers. And you would be right. Yes, we love contemplation and solitude, but we are not averse to the sharing of ideas nor to spending time together. In fact, we are following the example of some ten million Japanese writers who

practice haiku and who gather together in a multitude of ku-kais (creation workshops led by a *sensei*) and associations who ensure that this ancient art continues to evolve thanks to intense collaboration and enlightened critiques. These ku-kais and associations then collaborate to organise festivals.


This is how it came to be that Quebec's kukai organised the 7<sup>th</sup> International Haiku Festival of the Association francophone de haïku (AFH) last October 13 to 16. The AFH is based in France, in the Lyon region, and they publish *Gong!*, a magazine that only publishes haikus. Its mem-

bers come from everywhere in the Francophonie (just over one third of them live in Canada, mostly in Quebec). So you can imagine that, when I learned that the next festival of the AFH was being held in Quebec, in the fall, when the maple trees are in all their glory, I pounced on the opportunity and bought my plane ticket.

I certainly did not regret it: a picturesque location, stimulating conferences, captivating recitals, and friendly and enriching encounters. The Festival took place in Old Quebec, mostly at the Maison de la Littérature, a former Presbyterian church that was renovated to serve as a literary den. An ideal setting for 97 haiku poets from

Quebec, Ontario, the Maritimes, Manitoba, the United States, France, Switzerland and Belgium. I developed relationships and strengthened my connections with the kukai group I lead, the Kukaï Rouge (based at MGR), as well as with kukai groups from Quebec, Montreal, Baie-Comeau, Sept-Îles and Campbellton. I shared in the triumphs of our own haiku poets from Manitoba and jotted down inspiring ideas from my poetry accomplices.

During the festival, I participated in two readings in which I presented my own haikus as well as those written by the haiku maniacs of the Kukaï Rouge before an enthusiastic crowd. During the closing ceremonies, there were two magnificent presentations. The first: an adaptation of the scene portrayed in the collection *s'agripper aux fleurs* written by Louise Canapé, Louve Mathieu and Shan-Dak Volant; the second: Zachary Richard presenting both haikus and songs. First-class art.

I came back from Quebec with eyes overflowing with colours, a soul full of haikus, a spirit revived by all these ideas and my heart overflowing with new friendships. Do you want to become a member of the Kukaï Rouge? If so, contact me at basile@mymts.net.

#### Writers' workshops

True to its mission to promote writing in the French language, MGR is offering a series of three workshops on short story writing under the tutelage of writer-inresidence Bertrand Nayet. Workshops will take place January 21, February 11 and March 4.

In the meantime, visitors are invited to take in a historic exhibition on teaching in the French language in Manitoba, put up by our volunteers Lise Brémault, Claudette Dumas, Colombe Fafard-Chartier and Norma Rocan.

### Help us renovate

The first phase of renovations at Maison Gabrielle-Roy was undertaken during the month of December. The work consisted in replacing the carpet in the basement, which was quite damaged, with a very solid vinyl flooring with a hardwood design (see picture at the right).

The work was contracted out to Exclusive Carpets of Winnipeg, one of the three companies that had given us an estimate. The total bill, \$5,638.00, has already been paid. Our thanks to volunteer Jean Dumas who led the project from beginning to end.

The Province of Manitoba has accepted to contribute \$6,000.00 towards the second phase of the work, which consists in repairing the verandah and the roof of the house. However, this grant money is conditional upon the MGR contributing the same amount towards the project.

We hope to meet this goal with the help of the fundraising campaign that we launched last December. To date, about 14% of MGR members to whom we sent

a letter, along with a lottery-calendar, have responded. The total amount of donations is currently at about \$1,700, averaging about \$80 per donation. We extend warm thanks to all our donors.

#### **Bâtisseurs d'Amérique :** des Canadiens français qui ont fait l'histoire

Authors' collective, La Presse, Nov. 2016, 408 p, \$37 (paperback)/\$26 (digital)

The work is a collection of portraits of 13 French-Canadian men and women who have made a mark in the history of North America in the fields of politics. culture, sports and the economy. Amongst them: Gabrielle Roy, whose portrait is drawn by Margaret Atwood. Other important figures include Jack Kerouac, Jacques Plante, Henri Bourassa and George-Étienne Cartier.

Les éditions La montagne **secrète** (Montreal), who specialise in the creation of CD books for children, are planning to adapt Gabrielle Roy's short story Le vieillard et l'enfant into an illustrated album accompanied by about ten original songs.
